Historic Landscape Tours Give Visitors a New View of Olana and Celebrate Frederic Church's Legacy

HUDSON, NY---The Olana Partnership is launching the 2016 season at Olana by introducing regular public tours of Olana's historic landscape. This is a dramatic and fundamental expansion of the visitor experience and coincides with the 50th Anniversary of the saving of Olana from the brink of destruction. Landscape tours will begin on Friday, May 20 and continue through Sunday, November 6. Guided group landscape tours along Olana's carriage roads are available via an open-air electric vehicle and on foot, and a self-guided version is available through a downloadable cell phone app. These new tours present Olana as an integrated work of art, architecture, conservation, agriculture and landscape design and take the visitor to key locations in Olana's landscape.

Olana's 250-acre naturalistic landscape is one of Frederic Church's great works of art, and it exists today as one of the most intact artist-designed landscapes in the United States. It also possesses an exceptional sense of place created by a famous Hudson River School painter in the birthplace of that art movement. Church was intimately involved in all aspects of his landscape's creation and design. "I am busy landscape architecturing!" wrote Church in 1887. His large-scale composition included a working and ornamental farm, varied architectural elements, an "artificial" lake, native woodlands, and more than five miles of carriage roads, so

that visitors could move through and experience Olana's crafted foreground against a backdrop of sublime and far-reaching views.

Frederic Church carefully designed Olana's 250 acres with an artist's eye to his property's 360-degree "borrowed views". Similar to the background element in one of his landscape paintings, Church's three-dimensional design incorporated views of neighboring landforms, valleys, the Hudson River and distant mountains. The views beyond Olana – its "viewshed" – were an essential part of Church's original composition. The Olana Viewshed was Church's muse, and in the 21st century it remains a vital part of Olana's integrity as a complete work of art.

Over the last few decades, a collaborative effort among preservation organizations, governmental divisions and private landowners has resulted in the protection of important views from Olana. To date, nearly 3,000 acres have been protected, largely through conservation easements. In recent years, The Olana Partnership has begun to include the integral viewshed in its interpretation of Church's design and Olana's larger preservation story. "What's exciting is that you get to put your body into the painting. You get to live and breathe the work of art. As you move along the carriage roads, you inhabit an artful landscape" said Thomas Woltz from the consulting architects Nelson Bryd Woltz Landscape Architects. Historic Landscape tours mark a milestone in The Olana Partnership's ongoing mission to restore and interpret Church's legacy. It is their desire for visitors from near and far to experience the full story and vision of Frederic Church's Olana – a Living American Masterpiece.

Several specialty events and hikes in the landscape will be offered to highlight this inaugural season including exploring the night sky during the Skyscape Series, combining patterns of steps and breathing during Breathwalk, a number of Artful Hikes, Geoology, and the annual Barry Hopkins Run.

The Landscape Tour Program is funded in part by grants from The New York State Parks and Trails Partnership Program of New York's Environmental Protection Fund, The Thomas A. and Georgina T.
